

Dr. Thomas Matyók [*mat-CHOCK*] is an associate professor and department chair in the Department of Peace and Conflict Studies within the School of Health and Human Sciences. He joined the UNCG faculty in 2007, and prior to that - and this is a rather unusual pathway for a faculty member - he served in the United States Army for 23 years. His duty assignments included the 3rd United States Infantry (The Old Guard), the 1st Battalion Airborne, and the 509th Infantry in Vicenza, Italy. He also served in various positions with the 2nd Armored Division in Germany, and the 24th Infantry Division including Operations DESERT SHIELD and DESERT STORM.

Dr. Matyók [*mat-CHOCK*] has been involved in conflict resolution for over 35 years as a mediator, negotiator, facilitator, trainer, coach, systems designer, researcher, and professor. He

has consulted for private, civic, religious, and community organizations; negotiated significant international agreements, and been recognized for his abilities by the United States Coast Guard and United States Army as well as national and international human rights organizations. He also received the distinguished honor of becoming a Fulbright Scholar last year. His current research interests are violence, peace and stability operations, religion and peacebuilding, institutions of peace, and conflict analysis. As a faculty member, he has continued to support the United States military by serving in teaching and research roles at several educational institutions within the armed forces.
